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



Acceptable Materials

RESIDENTIAL HOUSEHOLD ITEMS ONLY

RECYCLABLES: Paper, cans, plastic, glass, electronics, metal (recyclables must be pre-separated from trash)

YARD WASTE: Limbs no longer than 4 feet and no larger than 4 inches in diameter. Wood chipper on site—free mulch may be available. First come-first served. Load your own truck.

TRASH: Household waste, junk

FLUORESCENTS, BATTERIES and BULBS will NOT Be Accepted

Vehicle Batteries will still be collected

ELECTRONICS RECYCLING: Old computers, TV's, cell phones, Anything with a cord.

What's not allowed: Tires, appliances, wet paint (dried paint is OK), toxic or hazardous materials, commercial waste, fluorescents, Light Bulbs & Household Batteries. (Some items may be taken to the County Landfill)

Fats, Oils and Grease (FOG) Ordinance

Background:

Sanitary sewer overflows are a serious environmental problem and are a violation of the Clean Water Act. A large percentage of sewer overflows and backups are caused by misuse of the collection system by the public. Fats, Oils and Grease (FOG) can solidify in the pipe and cause stoppages. The Federal Government through the State of North Carolina is requiring utilities to meet minimum operation standards through a permit process. The Collection System Permit requires a FOG Ordinance to address this problem. Operating at or above this minimum standard provides some protection from fines and liability for property damage.

WHEN DO YOU NEED A PERMIT

If you are considering building a new home or garage, or adding an accessory structure, it is important that you get the appropriate permits. A permit insures that your construction project complies with zoning and stormwater regulations.

Your first stop is City Hall. City staff will sit down with you to discuss your construction project and lay out what you need to get started. Beginning with our development review checklist, we will discuss the steps you need to take and determine whether or not you need a permit.

The cost of permits range from \$0 to more than \$300.00 depending on the complexity of the project and the level of technical review required for approval.

SWAT-A-LITTERBUG

Residents can help keep Trinity clean by reporting incidents of roadway littering to the NC Department of Transportation.

Upon receipt of litterbug information, DOT will notify the vehicle owner of the littering offense, inform the vehicle owner of the penalties for littering and urge the litterbug to stop littering through a letter from the Colonel of the NC State Highway Patrol.

Effects of stormwater runoff

Stormwater runoff that has been polluted has adverse effects on plants, fish, animals, and people.

Sediment clouds the water and makes it difficult for aquatic plants to grow and can destroy aquatic habitats. Too many nutrients form fertilizers and pesticides can cause algae blooms, and in turn, remove oxygen from the water when it begins to decompose. When oxygen levels are low, fish and other organisms cannot survive.

Bacteria and other pathogens from pet waste can wash into recreational areas and create serious health problems. Litter, such as cigarette butts, bottles, cans, and plastic items often wash into creeks and streams and can kill, suffocate or hurt the creatures that reside there.

Most open burning illegal in NC

North Carolina law prohibits most open burning because the smoke from outdoor fires can cause serious health problems and pollute the air. It is illegal to burn trash and other non-vegetative materials. However, homeowners can burn yard trimmings - except for stumps and logs over 6 inches in diameter - as long as it doesn't cause a public nuisance. Other allowable burning includes fireplaces, campfires, outdoor barbecues and bonfires for festive occasions. Landowners may be allowed to burn vegetation to clear land or clean up storm debris, but they should check first with the Division of Air Quality in Winston-Salem.




GENERAL HARDEE'S RETREAT

150TH ANNIVERSARY

The final surrender of Confederate troops reportedly took place at the site of Braxton Craven School. At that time Gen. William Hardee was camped at Trinity College with 20,000 soldiers and 7,000 horses spread over six miles along the road leading to Archdale.

General Hardee was in charge of the Department of South Carolina, Georgia, and Florida and had slowed General William T. Sherman's March to the Sea by delaying Sherman at Savanna. Hardee later joined Gen. Joseph Johnston at the Battle of Bentonville and surrendered at Trinity when he learned that Johnston was negotiating surrender at Bennett Place in Durham.

GRASS GROWING SEASON IS FAST APPROCHING

Please be aware the City of Trinity has an ordinance regarding **TALL GRASS**:



CHAPTER 91: GENERAL PUBLIC NUISANCES.

(A) Any weeds or other noxious vegetation having an overall height of more than 18 inches above the surrounding ground provided that the following shall not be considered to be part of this condition: trees and ornamental shrubs; cultured plants; natural vegetation on undeveloped property that is not a threat to the character of surrounding properties; and flowers and growing and producing vegetable plants.
